Good morning -

Some 20 years ago, a bunch of us (including some of you) got together and formed the Neighborhood Alliance, which with the city's support nurtured into being dozens of neighborhood associations throughout Boise. Our purpose was to give citizens equal legal footing in the development processes that affected the value of their property and the quality of their life. I'm very proud of the way East Enders have responded to St. Luke's proposal through their neighborhood association and through the ad hoc nonprofit they formed, Keep Boise Connected, Inc.

Unfortunately, the constructive give-and-take between applicant and neighbors that we worked so hard to codify in the city's planning process did not occur with this project. The applicant's attitude when making its mandatory presentation to EENA was, to put it bluntly, "like it or lump it." St. Luke's preferred alternative, which requires closing Jefferson Street, was non-negotiable in any substantial way.

If the council chooses to ignore this flawed process AND the recommendation of their own Planning and Zoning Commission to reject the proposal because it does not meet the requirements of the city's comprehensive plan, they will set a dangerous precedent. Citizens who devote substantial time and effort to work within the system only to see its requirements for honest, constructive give-and-take ignored by policy-makers will be disillusioned and unlikely to use this avenue again. The consequences of citizen disengagement are subtle but ultimately devastating to creating the "livable city" that you have so often said you want.

Tonight, you need only to uphold the P&Z recommendation to deny this master plan application and send it back to the applicant with instructions to alter it to meet the requirements of our comprehensive plan. This project will dramatically alter the east end of downtown, cut off a neighborhood, and add thousands of vehicles to already congested intersections over 30 years. We can afford to take another six months to find an alternative with fewer negative consequences. One suggestion: Bring ACHD and Valley Ride into the process meaningfully NOW, so the parties can include mass transit/park-and-ride as part of the "moving people not cars" equation. I still believe we can find a solution that works for everyone.

I have concerns about the downtown St. Luke's expansion as proposed for three basic reasons:

- 1. The expansion could forever change the character of this area, and how we interact in that area. Expanded intersections, new buildings and parking structures will change how we interact with our surroundings. Increased traffic and new traffic configurations would certainly encourage people to get off the bike and back into a car.
- 2. I don't understand why St. Luke's would choose a downtown Boise location, rather than the large Meridian campus. One would expect St. Luke's might want to have the most services available to the most people near the valley's population center, and near the interstate. Why is this expansion not happening at the Meridian site?
- 3. Boise's own Planning and Zoning Commissioners said the expansion "did not demonstrate consistency with Comprehensive Plan goals and policies related to street connectivity, protection of the downtown grid and provision of bicycle/pedestrian facilities."

For this reason, I oppose the St. Luke's downtown expansion plan. The St. Luke's plan threatens livability in the East End and the North End by increasing motorized traffic in both areas. Increased traffic also threatens the goals of public safety and environmental health.

Dear Members of the City Council and dear Mayor Bieter,

I am writing to register my strong opposition to the downtown expansion of St. Luke's Hospital.

For several reasons, this is the wrong location for an expansion of this size.

There is simply not enough physical space for all the planned buildings, parking garage[s], added lanes, and enlarged intersections at this site. At the same time, the expansion will have a sad negative impact on one of the most scenic spots in Boise.

The expansion will also harm one of Boise's most pleasant and valuable historic neighborhoods. The location is unique in its convenience for residents. Close to the river, foothills, BSU, Julia Davis Park, the grocery stores, and downtown stores and restaurants, it is arguably the most walkable of all neighborhoods. It is also a favorite with bikers and runners.

I have lived on East Bannock street (parallel to Warm Springs on the north side) for thirteen years, and I have seen the neighborhood blossom. There has been with an influx of families, including ones with children, who have moved in, restored homes, planted gardens and flowers. It is a lovely, old-fashioned community where neighbors meet at Roosevelt Market across from Roosevelt Elementary School, which was beautifully renovated not too long ago. On my street, neighbors gather in a private garden for social interaction, and children play on the sidewalks. If allowed to thrive, this neighborhood will shine even more more brightly as one of Boise's most attractive features.

I am truly not just motivated by self-interest when I say that I dread the prospect of lovely, tree-shaded East Bannock Street turning into a corridor, officially or unofficially.

I fear for the safety of the children. For myself, I dread waiting and then actually crossing the intersection of Broadway and Warm Springs by foot or by bike. Not just an inconvenience is the prospect of a blocked exodus in case of wildfire or flood. We are in a flood-zone, and I suspect that in case of disaster there could be a serious evacuation problem with the increase in traffic and just one major road allowing exit. In fact, I don't really understand why St. Luke's would want to invest so much money on an expansion in a flood-zone.

I have travelled some and seen beautiful cities. I have also seen some destroyed by unrestrained traffic. The ones I remember most fondly are not ones with most impressive freeways but ones with charming neighborhoods and pedestrian zones. As committee members, ask yourselves what you want to be remembered for--a huge hospital too big for its surroundings or the preservation of one of Boise's nicest areas.

Dear Mayor Bieter and Members of the Boise City Council,

In full disclosure (as evidenced by my signature) I am a St. Luke's employee. However, I am also writing you this morning as a long-time resident of historic east Boise, mother, public health professional, recreational cyclist, and regular patron of many downtown Boise establishments.

For a decade, my husband and I have raised our family of four boys in east Boise off of Warm Springs. Currently, my children attend Boise High, Roosevelt Elementary and the Downtown YMCA Children's Village. We commute regularly as a family into the downtown core via bicycle, using 3 adult bikes, 1 child's bike, 1 Tag-Along bike and 1 bike trailer. Safety is our utmost concern.

Additionally, my oldest child often rides alone or with friends to Boise High for school or sports. Last fall, my son's best friend was hit on his bike in the intersection of Fort and Reserve by a hit-and-run driver. Due to heavy congestion at numerous points during the day, this is a very dangerous, uncontrolled intersection. Since that time, I have been deeply concerned about the safety of any route into downtown from the east. As it exists, I feel our current options (and I have attempted them all) between State Street and the Greenbelt fail to provide basic protections for riders. In this heavily trafficked grid, cyclists and pedestrians are at risk...we are simply not seen.

I understand why Jefferson is considered a safe haven and why its closure is concerning; it is one of the less traveled streets and riders feel a small measure of protection using that access point into the downtown core. However, as someone who spends a great deal of time walking the Boise hospital campus, I can tell you this block is not a safe solution. It is packed with parked cars, delivery vehicles, ambulances, and hospital staff crossing from the main hospital into various buildings. Although it is a public street, it essentially functions as an alley behind the hospital with poor visibility for riders.

For these reasons, I ask you to support the St. Luke's Campus Master Plan. Not only does this plan provide room for critical healthcare services to remain in downtown Boise, but it provides a better, safer commute for those traveling on bike or foot from the east end neighborhood. Please take advantage of this opportunity to build something that will benefit our neighborhood for years to come and maintain Boise's reputation as being a city friendly to those on two wheels.

Mayor Bieter,

I do not support St Luke's proposal to close Jefferson St. as part of its Boise Development Master Plan.

Closing the proposed portion of Jefferson Street will be detrimental to commuters, businesses, and residents. Jefferson St. provides the only safe cycling route between NE Boise and the downtown area. Closing access would force cyclists to use highly hazardous routes, such as Fort St., Street, and the Main/Idaho/Ave B/Broadway intersection – neither of which provides bike lanes, or adequate protection for cyclists.

I am also deeply disappointed in St. Luke's public relations campaign to cultivate support for its plans. When St. Luke's announced it had the endorsement of local cycling legend, Kristin Armstrong, they failed to mention that she is an employee of St. Luke's. When the Idaho Statesman published an article in support of the plan to close Jefferson St., it did so citing that "Publisher Michael Jung is a member of the St. Luke's Strategic Initiatives Committee." At best this, this represents an overt conflict of interest; at worst, it's collusion.

The community is grateful to have a world-class medical facility such as St. Luke's in Boise. However, the city's gratitude does not extend beyond its desire to retain the livability for which it is famous. I am not opposed to St. Luke's expanding in the downtown corridor. However, I am vehemently opposed to any plan that allows St. Luke's to close a portion of any street - particularly a main thoroughfare such as Jefferson St. Perhaps St. Luke's should consider expanding over its existing, ground-level parking, rather than shutting off a significant commuting thoroughfare.

Hello Mayor Bieter -

One Doctor's Opinion on the expansion. Thank you!

St. Luke's provides excellent care and top-notch expertise. Hospital executives argue that expansion is necessary because in emergencies, seconds matter. Closure of Jefferson Street would connect emergency services to interventional radiology and save lives.

What save lives are the following: adequate staffing on the front lines of patient care, clinician competence, well-designed processes, and effective communication across the care team. Physical space does not save lives. The larger an organization, the more logistical challenges, and the greater the delays in care. Physical grandeur and proximity do not equal better care. In fact, studies show that patients who have a stroke while in the hospital suffer long delays in getting thrombolysis and life-saving care. Larger facilities are also typically associated with greater overhead which translates into higher costs that are ultimately passed on to us all. Outpatient care costs are substantially higher at a hospital than at a physician's office.

Only a tiny minority of emergency room patients need interventional radiology. Most hospital admissions are for infections, congestive heart failure, drug overdoses, emphysema, blood clots, surgical issues, and the like. What good is it to whisk someone away for intervention while Mrs. Jones lies on a gurney for hours awaiting admission for her pneumonia? The reality is that cardiac and stroke patients are outnumbered by general medical/surgical patients who often sit in emergency rooms for hours awaiting admission and higher level care. Their lives are every bit as important as the stroke patient's.

I would ask our community: Has access to your physician improved as a result of expansion, i.e. by hospital acquisition of local physician groups? Did the quality of your health care improve? Has it become more cost effective? Would you prefer to navigate a larger hospital campus?


St. Luke's has a large enough footprint to reconfigure on its existing acreages without closing tax payer owned roads and encroaching on historic properties to expand intersections and roadways. Options include building upward from the existing hospital parking lot or relocating outpatient services to its other Boise properties. This would leave plenty of room at the existing downtown campus for inpatient services and future growth.

For community health, it benefits all to have a safe route of access to downtown, whether on bike, foot, or car. Jefferson Street is the safest route for a child, commuter or family to access downtown.

The solution to growth is reconfiguration, avoiding duplication of services (leave the trauma care to St. Al's), adequate staffing, and reduction of costly executive and managerial positions.

In conclusion, while I am thankful to have St. Luke's in my neighborhood, there are better ways to spend \$400 million improving heath care in Boise than the proposed campus expansion.

Dear Mayor Bieter,

Our thriving downtown neighborhoods are a vital part of Boise's uniqueness and livability. My family opposes the closure of Jefferson Street, a critical street connecting the East End to downtown and neighborhood amenities. We believe there are alternatives to the proposed Saint Luke's Master Plan that will allow Saint Luke's to grow, without sacrificing the East End neighborhood as collateral damage. Additionally, prior to approval, a Saint Luke's Master Plan needs to legitimately address the traffic impacts, not only at the Broadway/Warm Springs intersection, but also on neighborhood streets where spinoff traffic will increase, particularly Walnut Street and Warm Springs' Avenue.

We chose the East End as our home. We appreciate being able to easily and safely walk, bike or drive to work, downtown and the many attractions and services in our neighborhood. This includes amenities like the Boise Little Theater, Fort Boise Community Center, the Senior Center, the Universities and all of the wonderful parks and outdoor assets. This connectivity is critical to the East End lifestyle and our link to downtown.

My questions about traffic increases on Walnut and Warm Springs were not answered at the Saint Luke's information sessions. Many of us who live in the East End recognize that Walnut Street has already become the de facto "Broadway Bypass." If both Bannock and Jefferson Streets are closed, the trips will move somewhere else. It is reasonable to expect additional traffic on both Warm Springs and Walnut either by necessity or as a strategy to avoid the heavy traffic projected for the Broadway/Warm Springs' intersection. Yet, at a recent Saint Luke's information meeting, I was told that there would not be traffic impacts on Walnut or Warm Springs. Later I was informed by others that spin-off impacts on these streets were actually not considered during the Master Plan development and study process. I request that you require evaluation of the bigger picture neighborhood traffic impacts (specifically Walnut and Warm Springs) and consideration of design alternatives which would leave either Jefferson or Bannock Street open.

The East End neighborhood does not have to be marginalized as "East End Island" in order for a needed hospital expansion to move forward. Please direct Saint Luke's to work with the City to develop real, big picture alternatives to their present Master Plan, alternatives that honor Blueprint Boise, protect East End neighborhood connectivity and livability and provide a state of the art hospital.

I am opposed to the closing of E. Jefferson for the benefit of St. Lukes Hospital. I feel very strongly that this is unwarranted action by a major business in the City to use financial and political power to "get their way".

I have been a citizen of the City of Boise for over 70 years. During that time our family has either resided or owned property in the East End area.

During that time I have seen a disturbing change in the way St. Lukes has operated. In my early memories St. Lukes was a faith based hospital that cooperated with St. Alphonsus and Elks Rehabilitation to provide the best service to the citizens of Boise and the Treasure Valley. It now seems that there is a "hospital war" that seems both unnecessary and contrary to the needs of the community.

Several years ago Ada County assessed the St. Lukes property because they were no longer functioning as a non profit, but had accumulated funds in a way that was more like a commercial enterpirse. They "lawyered up" and as I recall beat down the Commission.

When St. Alphonsus merged with Mercy Hospital in Nampa (also a catholic based hospital) St. Lukes purchased a medical practice that contained a vast majority of the doctors in the community. Because of the extensive use of referrals in the medical area, this would have caused great harm to Mercy Hospital (St. Alphonsus) They fought the justice department, lost in court, but are so arrogant that they refuse to comply with the court's decision.

Now they want to limit access to down town Boise for hundreds of residents of the East End of Boise.

If they must have access to both sides of E. Jefferson, perhaps they should consider a sky bridge similar to the one on the St. Alphonsus campus

I'm calling again; I called before when this first came up about the expansion of St. Luke's in downtown Boise and I know that it seems like a lot of attention has gone into the Jefferson St. closure. The City Council is hearing this again tonight and I wanted to again voice my opposition to the expansion of their main campus in downtown Boise. I actually work at St. Luke's and I haven't been able to be more active on this or go to meetings. It's kind of a subtle thing, but I think they're more sensitive about it than people anticipate. I was very pleased that there was a delay and that they were unable to push this through. Again, I feel like the closure of Jefferson is really somewhat of a smokescreen and the bigger issue is the traffic coming into downtown Boise. 75% of the people who work at the Boise downtown St. Luke's travel in from outside of the downtown area. I was a little incensed that they threatened to remove services from downtown. They have always said that they would have services, it would not just be the main campus anymore. I have serious concerns about the traffic circle on Fort St. and the impact on the North End. I was very disappointed in the North End Neighborhood Association where I live that they didn't take a more active stance against this. I think it will impact traffic, impact Fort Boise Community Center, that whole Foothills corridor there extending down to the VA, and all the way into 8th St. I know that Mayor Bieter walks and rides his bike in that area. The thought of a multi-floor center and multiple large buildings attracting people from all over the state to that area of town without planning for masstransit is a mistake. You tried to have those trolley systems and I can tell you that St. Luke's did not support that in any way; there was no effort with employees to support that kind of plan. They have very poor commuter efforts with their van, and when it comes to bike lanes, I have actively ridden my bike to work for many years and have seen the traffic increase. They don't have good bike lanes, whoever is in charge of that, there's supposed to be a bike lane designated on Fort St. on that sidewalk that isn't even marked. There are always people riding their bikes on there without helmets; I'm very concerned about this whole growth and car-based focus on getting those employees into that area. I know this is a long message but it's my only opportunity; I would be happy to speak to someone, but again I'm feeling a little cautious. Dear Members of the City Council and dear Mayor Bieter,

I am writing to register my strong opposition to the downtown expansion of St. Luke's Hospital.

For several reasons, this is the wrong location for an expansion of this size.

There is simply not enough physical space for all the planned buildings, parking garage[s], added lanes, and enlarged intersections at this site. At the same time, the expansion will have a sad negative impact on one of the most scenic spots in Boise.

The expansion will also harm one of Boise's most pleasant and valuable historic neighborhoods. The location is unique in its convenience for residents. Close to the river, foothills, BSU, Julia Davis Park, the grocery stores, and downtown stores and restaurants, it is arguably the most walkable of all neighborhoods. It is also a favorite with bikers and runners.

I have lived on East Bannock street (parallel to Warm Springs on the north side) for thirteen years, and I have seen the neighborhood blossom. There has been with an influx of families, including ones with children, who have moved in, restored homes, planted gardens and flowers. It is a lovely, old-fashioned community where neighbors meet at Roosevelt Market across from Roosevelt Elementary School, which was beautifully renovated not too long ago. On my street, neighbors gather in a private garden for social interaction, and children play on the sidewalks. If allowed to thrive, this neighborhood will shine even more more brightly as one of Boise's most attractive features.

I am truly not just motivated by self-interest when I say that I dread the prospect of lovely, tree-shaded East Bannock Street turning into a corridor, officially or unofficially.

I fear for the safety of the children. For myself, I dread waiting and then actually crossing the intersection of Broadway and Warm Springs by foot or by bike. Not just an inconvenience is the prospect of a blocked exodus in case of wildfire or flood. We are in a flood-zone, and I suspect that in case of disaster there could be a serious evacuation problem with the increase in traffic and just one major road allowing exit. In fact, I don't really understand why St. Luke's would want to invest so much money on an expansion in a flood-zone.

I have travelled some and seen beautiful cities. I have also seen some destroyed by unrestrained traffic. The ones I remember most fondly are not ones with most impressive freeways but ones with charming neighborhoods and pedestrian zones. As committee members, ask yourselves what you want to be remembered for--a huge hospital too big for its surroundings or the preservation of one of Boise's nicest areas.

We have lived in Boise's East End of Boise at 604 E. Jefferson and 1320 E. Hays Way, (our current address) for over 25 years. We chose to live in this neighborhood due to its livability and close proximity to work, good schools, the Boise River, foothills, and downtown. I pass through the St. Luke's corridor 4 to 8 times per day. We frequently drive, walk, and bike down E. Jefferson to get into downtown. We love our neighborhood and do not want to live any place else. Our daughters were born in the St. Lukes Hospital and we appreciate having this facility as our neighbor. However, it is important to remember that we are a historic neighborhood and that closing part of Jefferson Street and making a "superblock" will increase traffic congestion and reduce the East End's connectivity to downtown.

We are connected to downtown by State, Jefferson, Idaho, and Main streets. Even without the St Luke's expansion traffic has been increasing due to new development in the foothills and in the Harris Ranch area. The intersections at State and Fort, Jefferson and Avenue B, Warm Springs and Avenue B, and Broadway and the Connector are all getting congested. St. Luke's new expansion plan estimates an additional 17,000 plus traffic trips per day. A large portion of this traffic will be headed to the new employee and patient parking garage turning left across traffic onto 1st and 2nd streets making driving through this area difficult.

Making a left turn onto Warm Springs, across traffic, has become difficult. More traffic will also divert onto Warm Springs and Walnut to avoid getting onto Avenue B adding more traffic to this area. My understanding is that a traffic limit of 1400 trips per day was placed on Warm Springs when the Harris Ranch was first being developed. Will we or have we already exceeded this limit? Heavy traffic on Warm Springs street poses a serious threat to this beautiful and important street. Warm Springs is a historic district and one of the things that makes Boise, Boise.

The increase in traffic will also impact pedestrians and cyclists making it dangerous to cross this area. I believe there are some flashing lights proposed for the pedestrian crossing will be added to make cars aware and stop. I cannot see four lanes of traffic stopping that easily and

when they do stop, traffic will start to back up.

The Boise P and Z Commission has denied the St. Luke's application whose proposal is inconsistent with Boise's broader planning and livability goals and plans. St. Luke's has come up with one plan and eliminated all the options (such as developing St. Luke's Meridian and using other St. Luke's sites located in Boise) as too expensive. The neighborhoods have had little input and involvement in their plans.

We believe the St. Luke's Regional Medical facility expansion should be built in Meridian where they have 25 acres and easy access to the freeway. This location is more centralized to the valley's population. The expansions of St. Luke's in Boise on Avenue B will have to cease eventually, as there is no space to keep expanding in this area. The new larger traffic corridor in the East End planned by St. Luke's will make the East End neighborhood like an island with limited direct access to downtown. It will be like hitting a wall when we try to head west out of our neighborhood. I urge you to vote no on the St Luke's Master Plan.

Thank you for meeting with me and with Gary Sorensen to review the proposed Conditions of Approval contained in your June 16, 2015 Staff Report, and for inviting us to provide comments. We understand that you would appreciate, assuming the Council approves our application, that we include in the Master Plan illustrations capturing Conditions 1.a through 1.e and text capturing Conditions 2.a through 2.g. We are generally in agreement with the conditions as modified below

Conditions of Approval

- 1. The St. Luke's Health Facilities Master Plan as amended by the March 2015 Supplemental Narrative is the approved Plan, with the following additional modifications:
- a. The Bannock Corridor between Avenue B and 1st Street shall be preserved for public access by an approximately 28-foot wide easement within which no further building construction is allowed and shall include a 10-foot dual use pathway as conceptually depicted in the Supplemental Narrative, dated March 2015, that is open to the public pedestrians and cyclists. The pathway shall include visually identifiable yield zones for cyclists at pedestrian crossings. The final design of the pathway will emerge through workshop(s) with the City and interested stakeholders. The easement shall be as approved by the Boise City Attorney and shall be maintained by St. Luke's.
- b. Transit stops intended to serve a future fixed line downtown circulator shall be depicted <u>conceptually</u> at <u>appropriate</u>-locations on Main and Idaho Streets between 2nd Street and Avenue B.
- c. Bicycle lane facilities on Idaho and Main Streets shall be described and depicted in the Master Plan with a strong preference for a buffered or protected lane design.
- d. The Design Standards in the Master Plan shall be modified to describe a requirement that the Design Review Committee, in its review of visible exterior improvements on fer the outer edges of new buildings on the campus perimeter, to createshall review such buildings for a compatible inter-face with adjacent uses through, for example, upper story setbacks, additional modulation and/or enhanced landscaping and ground level setbacks.
- e. St. Luke's shall work with Boise Urban Forestry and PDS to preserve existing mature trees and vegetation in the public right-of-way around the campus perimeter, particularly on 2nd Street where large street trees exist. Building facade modulation, cycle track width or street sections may be reduced or modified on those

frontages in return for setbacks that preserve mature trees. If trees are lost, replacement trees should be Class 3 or similar.

- 2. A new section shall be added to the approved Master Plan stipulating the following administrative requirements:
- a. Any request by St. Luke's for expanded HS (Health Services) zoning consistent with the Master Plan, shall be accompanied by a Land Use Map amendment application for the Public/Quasi-Public Land Use designation to match the boundaries of the rezone.
- b. Air quality permitting for the Central Plant shall be successfully obtained and documented to the City prior to submittal of a building permit.
- c. All mitigation/enhancement for roads and pathways (excluding the Broadway intersection) as required in the TIS, and the Master Plan and shall be addressed in the proposed three-party Development Agreement, shall be installed and in place prior to any construction other than the Children's Pavilion. Physical closure of Jefferson Street shall not occur until the improvements covered in the Development Agreement are in place or in progress, or bonded for improvement, as per the timing to be stipulated in the Development Agreement.
- d. Prior to any construction of any new building, other than the Children's Pavilion, St. Luke's shall schedule a "check-in" with the City Council at a public work session to review the status of roadway and pathway mitigation.
- f. If any required mitigation measure is determined to be infeasible to construct, the St. Luke's Master Plan shall be returned to the City Council for further review and potential amendment.
- g. St. Luke's shall enter into a three-party development agreement with the City of Boise and ACHD for the expedited design and construction of roadway and pedestrian improvements around the St. Luke's Campus as described in the Master Plan and the Fort Boise Concept Plan. Responsibilities for the three parties shall at minimum include the following: i) Boise City to facilitate redesign of the Fort Boise sports fields to accommodate a roundabout intersection at Avenue B and Reserve Street; ii) ACHD to move the Broadway intersection design and construction forward in the CIP; iii) St. Luke's to provide design assistance for all roadway mitigation (other than the Broadway intersection) including roundabouts at Reserve and 3rd/Robbins Street; (iv) physical closure of Jefferson Street shall not occur until the improvements covered in the Development Agreement are in place or in progress, or bonded for improvement, as per the timing to be stipulated in the Development Agreementand construct the improvements prior to any medical facility construction other than the Children's Pavilion; and iv) ACHD to enter into reimbursement agreement with St. Luke's for non-CIP improvements funded by St. Luke's.
- 3. Blue Print Boise shall be amended as follows to reflect the St. Luke's Master Plan approval:

NE-CCN 2.2: St. Luke's Regional Medical Center (Page NE 8)

- (a) Develop the St. Luke's Regional Medical Center area in accordance with the St. Luke's Health System's Master Plan <u>as approved by the City Council on</u> , <u>2015.</u>
- (b) Require an amendment to the Land Use Map for expansion of the HS zoning district outside of the designated Public/Institutional use area, in order for the City and St.Luke's to mitigate the impact on adjoining neighborhoods.

I am a resident of the east end, and I use Jefferson St to ride a bicycle to the YMCA about three times a week. I also use the Greenbelt and 8th Street to get to and from downtown. As full disclosure I was an employee of the downtown St Luke's for over 20 years, now retired. I have followed this issue closely and attended several information meetings. On balance, I believe that the east end, as well as the greater Boise community, would be best served by allowing St Luke's to expand downtown. Unlike most of the people who write to you, I have cared for patients in the hospital, and I know how impossible it would be to build only upper floors above Jefferson. I know how outdated and unsafe the old west end of the hospital is for patients. While I ride Jefferson frequently, I know it isn't perfect either. The parked cars opening doors in your face is hazardous, and the oneway grid forces bikes to use Bannock eastbound and then turn left across traffic to get back to Jefferson. A dedicated bike lane would be safer, and while we will complain that we are entitled to use the streets, we would come to appreciate the safety.

Dear Councilmembers:

St. Luke's master plan is a very costly endeavor with a number of potentially serious negative impacts which will not improve the economics or quality of life for Boise residents.

Firstly, in a recent traffic study conducted by the engineering firm CH2M HILL, it was recommended that an additional eight traffic lanes would be required at the intersection of Broadway-Warm Springs-Idaho-Avenue B to carry the 17,340 new daily trips the hospital expansion would generate. This means that a 27 lane intersection, similar to the one at Franklin Rd. and Milwaukie, would be placed in a residential environment. Since there is more pedestrian/bicycle usage in this area than at Franklin, a 27 lane intersection increases the likelihood of pedestrian/car accidents. Not only will residents have lost the use of through streets Bannock and potentially Jefferson, we will also have to put up with increased traffic, noise, pollution, and decreased pedestrian/bike safety to accommodate the master plan.

Secondly, acquision of privately owned property in the area by St Luke's (a 501c3 charitable, non-profit) removes those properities from the Ada County tax rolls, creating a loss of tax revenue for Boise. In effect, property tax increases for residents will be used to subsidize St. Luke's master plan. Who will pay for the 27 lane intersection at Broadway that is required to accommodate the hospital's expansion? Using tax money to build an unnecessary intersection is a misuse of public funds to accommodate the needs of a private corporation.

Finally, whether St. Luke's likes to acknowledge it or not, there is another Regional Medical Center within five miles of this area--St. Alphonsus. It is not acceptable to the residents of East Boise to lose streets, historic structures, air quality, and tax monies so that St. Luke's can continue its aggressive competition with St. Al's. Part of St. Luke's master plan will add duplicate services already provided by St. Al's (for example, St. Al's has a staff of 17 doctors specializing in cardiology). The \$400 million cost of St. Luke's expansion could be reduced if the two hospitals would stop competing and start dividing up the services and specialties they offer.

Economically, the liabilities far outweigh the benefits of St. Luke's plan at this point. Please uphold the Boise Planning and Zoning Commission's rejection of this short-sighted and economically risky plan.

Observations on Public Comments

- The St. Luke's employees who responded Y to Boise expansion generally tended to be specialist physicians, administrators, or managers. That observation, initially made regarding the May 2015 analysis, remained the same for this supplemental analysis.
- There were few St. Luke's employees who responded N to expansion, but those that did respond against expansion tended to represent a greater cross section of employees (e.g., from physicians to those in nonmanagerial roles). This observation is likely less than robust, because of the limited numbers. However, one St. Luke's employee respondent did express her reluctance to speak at public hearings for fear of reprisal. Another respondent (not a St. Luke's employee) noted that a fellow East Ender/St. Luke's employee felt he could not speak out against the proposed Master Plan, after receiving numerous emails from his boss that he should attend and support St. Luke's. This respondent noted that because of St. Luke's pressure, the support among employees might be overrepresented while the opposition is underrepresented.
- The most often cited reason for not closing E Jefferson was the resulting traffic congestion. Bicycle/pedestrian access, and loss of a public resource to a private corporation, were also frequently cited.
- There were several anecdotal comments regarding the cost of health care; the perception that when St. Luke's "buys up" physician practices, costs go up; the burgeoning size of St. Luke's; the "grab" of a public resource by a tax exempt private corporation.
- There were also several expressions about the amount of money St. Luke's makes and the prices they charge, given that they are a tax exempt organization.
- Several of those who called for expanding in Boise specifically called out their desire to not have St. Luke's move their downtown facility to Meridian. Many clearly believed the continued presence of the entire Boise medical facility (not just "major services") was at stake.

Assumptions Used in Public Comment Summary: Expand in Boise/Close E Jefferson (Y/N)

- Any St. Luke's affiliate that was Y on Boise expansion knew enough about the Master Plan such that he/she also concurred with closing E Jefferson, and he/she was marked in favor of closing E Jefferson. This assumption was based on knowledge that St. Luke's has actively promoted the Master Plan to their employees, and belief they have similarly done so to contractors, donors, volunteers and retirees.
- If anyone else (i.e., not St. Luke's affiliate) that was Y on Boise expansion specifically called out a Y for closing E Jefferson, it was duly noted. However, if they were Y for expansion but did not specifically call out their support for closing E Jefferson, the "closing E Jefferson" columns were left blank. - If they were N on closing E Jefferson but specifically said Y to expansion, a Y for expansion was noted.
- If they were N on Boise expansion, a N on closing Jefferson was assumed.

Thank you for meeting with me and with Gary Sorensen to review the proposed Conditions of Approval contained in your June 16, 2015 Staff Report, and for inviting us to provide comments. We understand that you would appreciate, assuming the Council approves our application, that we include in the Master Plan illustrations capturing Conditions 1.a through 1.e and text capturing Conditions 2.a through 2.g. We are generally in agreement with the conditions as modified below

Conditions of Approval

- 1. The St. Luke's Health Facilities Master Plan as amended by the March 2015 Supplemental Narrative is the approved Plan, with the following additional modifications:
- a. The Bannock Corridor between Avenue B and 1st Street shall be preserved for public access by an approximately 28-foot wide easement within which no further building construction is allowed and shall include a 10-foot dual use pathway as conceptually depicted in the Supplemental Narrative, dated March 2015, that is open to the public pedestrians and cyclists. The pathway shall include visually identifiable yield zones for cyclists at pedestrian crossings. The final design of the pathway will emerge through workshop(s) with the City and interested stakeholders. The easement shall be as approved by the Boise City Attorney and shall be maintained by St. Luke's.
- b. Transit stops intended to serve a future fixed line downtown circulator shall be depicted <u>conceptually</u> at <u>appropriate</u>-locations on Main and Idaho Streets between 2nd Street and Avenue B.
- c. Bicycle lane facilities on Idaho and Main Streets shall be described and depicted in the Master Plan with a strong preference for a buffered or protected lane design.
- d. The Design Standards in the Master Plan shall be modified to describe a requirement that the Design Review Committee, in its review of visible exterior improvements on fer the outer edges of new buildings on the campus perimeter, to createshall review such buildings for a compatible inter-face with adjacent uses through, for example, upper story setbacks, additional modulation and/or enhanced landscaping and ground level setbacks.
- e. St. Luke's shall work with Boise Urban Forestry and PDS to preserve existing mature trees and vegetation in the public right-of-way around the campus perimeter, particularly on 2nd Street where large street trees exist. Building facade modulation, cycle track width or street sections may be reduced or modified on those

frontages in return for setbacks that preserve mature trees. If trees are lost, replacement trees should be Class 3 or similar.

- 2. A new section shall be added to the approved Master Plan stipulating the following administrative requirements:
- a. Any request by St. Luke's for expanded HS (Health Services) zoning consistent with the Master Plan, shall be accompanied by a Land Use Map amendment application for the Public/Quasi-Public Land Use designation to match the boundaries of the rezone.
- b. Air quality permitting for the Central Plant shall be successfully obtained and documented to the City prior to submittal of a building permit.
- c. All mitigation/enhancement for roads and pathways (excluding the Broadway intersection) as required in the TIS, and the Master Plan and shall be addressed in the proposed three-party Development Agreement, shall be installed and in place prior to any construction other than the Children's Pavilion. Physical closure of Jefferson Street shall not occur until the improvements covered in the Development Agreement are in place or in progress, or bonded for improvement, as per the timing to be stipulated in the Development Agreement.
- d. Prior to any construction of any new building, other than the Children's Pavilion, St. Luke's shall schedule a "check-in" with the City Council at a public work session to review the status of roadway and pathway mitigation.
- f. If any required mitigation measure is determined to be infeasible to construct, the St. Luke's Master Plan shall be returned to the City Council for further review and potential amendment.
- g. St. Luke's shall enter into a three-party development agreement with the City of Boise and ACHD for the expedited design and construction of roadway and pedestrian improvements around the St. Luke's Campus as described in the Master Plan and the Fort Boise Concept Plan. Responsibilities for the three parties shall at minimum include the following: i) Boise City to facilitate redesign of the Fort Boise sports fields to accommodate a roundabout intersection at Avenue B and Reserve Street; ii) ACHD to move the Broadway intersection design and construction forward in the CIP; iii) St. Luke's to provide design assistance for all roadway mitigation (other than the Broadway intersection) including roundabouts at Reserve and 3rd/Robbins Street; (iv) physical closure of Jefferson Street shall not occur until the improvements covered in the Development Agreement are in place or in progress, or bonded for improvement, as per the timing to be stipulated in the Development Agreementand construct the improvements prior to any medical facility construction other than the Children's Pavilion; and iv) ACHD to enter into reimbursement agreement with St. Luke's for non-CIP improvements funded by St. Luke's.
- 3. Blue Print Boise shall be amended as follows to reflect the St. Luke's Master Plan approval:

Table of Contents — List of Plans Adopted by Reference (Page vii) — Add new adoption date to St. Luke's Campus Master Plan reference

NE-CCN 2.2: St. Luke's Regional Medical Center (Page NE 8)

- (a) Develop the St. Luke's Regional Medical Center area in accordance with the St. Luke's Health System's Master Plan <u>as approved by the City Council on</u> , <u>2015.</u>
- (b) Require an amendment to the Land Use Map for expansion of the HS zoning district outside of the designated Public/Institutional use area, in order for the City and St.Luke's to mitigate the impact on adjoining neighborhoods.

I will be happy to review further with you these Conditions of Approval and St. Luke's comments at your convenience.

I have concerns about the downtown St. Luke's expansion as proposed for three basic reasons:

- 1. The expansion could forever change the character of this area, and how we interact in that area. Expanded intersections, new buildings and parking structures will change how we interact with our surroundings. Increased traffic and new traffic configurations would certainly encourage people to get off the bike and back into a car.
- 2. I don't understand why St. Luke's would choose a downtown Boise location, rather than the large Meridian campus. One would expect St. Luke's might want to have the most services available to the most people near the valley's population center, and near the interstate. Why is this expansion not happening at the Meridian site?
- 3. Boise's own Planning and Zoning Commissioners said the expansion "did not demonstrate consistency with Comprehensive Plan goals and policies related to street connectivity, protection of the downtown grid and provision of bicycle/pedestrian facilities."

Forgive one last imposition on your time and attention before the hearing tomorrow, but I think this will not be a waste of your time. I am sending along a missive from a friend of ours who is a healthcare professional and an astute analyst of healthcare trends. Please see below.

One doctor's opinion on the St. Luke's expansion by Ann Cordum MD

It is adequate staffing, systems, and processes that save lives and shave seconds off when timing counts in medical emergencies. The larger an organization becomes, the more cumbersome the processes, the more logistical challenges, and the greater the delays in care. I have seen this issue time and time again in hospitals over the past 25 years. Due to its purchase of a staggering number of doctor's practices in Boise, St. Luke's now has hundreds, perhaps thousands of middle managers and non-clinical staff to run the corporate machine. All of those people need offices and space. Many have never cared for a patient and have no idea what a patient needs. You are paying those managers' and executives' salaries through your health care premiums and out-of-pocket health care costs.

Patients are crying out for better care. Excessive growth and bureacracy worsen access to care. Currently, there is so much bureacracy in the large hospital systems that patients cannot even get in to see their own doctors when they call for an appointment. They are sometimes being sent to the emergency room instead of being seen in clinic. Some call our office desparate to be seen even though they have physicians in the big system. Physical expansion, hotel-like atriums, nice gardens and tree-lined parking lots will not solve that problem. Physical space does not equal faster treatment. There are studies showing that patients who have a stroke WHILE IN THE HOSPITAL suffer dreadfully long delays in getting thrombolysis and life-saving care (patients who are are on the hospital premises when their medical emergency occurs!)

Outpatient services administered by hospitals substantially drive up care costs. For example, according to a 2012 IMS institute for health care informatics study, the cost of daunorubicin (a chemotherapy drug used for cancer treatment) was 975% higher when administered at a hospital compared to a doctor's office. This is especially interesting considering that hospitals benefit from

deeply discounted drug pricing. The lab test that costs you and your insurance company \$55 at the hospital costs \$4.10 at our office. The mark-ups are staggering and are growing at a rapid rate.

I am thankful to have St. Luke's in my neighborhood and I value their care. But the solution to growth is reconfiguration, avoiding duplication of services (leave the trauma care to St. Al's), input from doctors/nurses/patients, reduction of managers and executives, sophisticated communication, and adequate staffing.

I will add one last thought. As you know, my analysis of projects and investments focuses on the net present value of same, i.e. after considering the quantifiable benefits and detriments of an investment, does it make sense to go ahead. I have yet to see ANY thorough analysis done by a dispassionate 3rd party or sanctioned by the City that makes such an attempt (recall our study on double taxation as a good example). I suggested strongly to St. Luke's in a prior meeting that they make this effort and have seen no meaningful comprehensive study. Without a balance sheet that encompasses such things as changes in VMT, infrastructure needs, air quality, retail, connectivity, neighborhood health, etc., I cannot see how this project merits approval. This development will have long-lasting influences on the visage and functionality of Boise City. I heartily encourage you to postpone a decision until the aforementioned analysis is done. If St. Luke's can't wait that long, so be it. This one is too important.

It is undeniable to me that St. Luke's needs more space - they are bursting at the seams. Sometimes it is difficult to find a room for a new patient because all the rooms are full.

What alarms me is talk I hear from my North and East End neighbors advocating that Luke's only expand in Meridian and move the core of its services out to Meridian. Observations on Public Comments

- The St. Luke's employees who responded Y to Boise expansion generally tended to be specialist physicians, administrators, or managers. That observation, initially made regarding the May 2015 analysis, remained the same for this supplemental analysis.
- There were few St. Luke's employees who responded N to expansion, but those that did respond against expansion tended to represent a greater cross section of employees (e.g., from physicians to those in nonmanagerial roles). This observation is likely less than robust, because of the limited numbers. However, one St. Luke's employee respondent did express her reluctance to speak at public hearings for fear of reprisal. Another respondent (not a St. Luke's employee) noted that a fellow East Ender/St. Luke's employee felt he could not speak out against the proposed Master Plan, after receiving numerous emails from his boss that he should attend and support St. Luke's. This respondent noted that because of St. Luke's pressure, the support among employees might be overrepresented while the opposition is underrepresented.
- The most often cited reason for not closing E Jefferson was the resulting traffic congestion. Bicycle/pedestrian access, and loss of a public resource to a private corporation, were also frequently cited.
- There were several anecdotal comments regarding the cost of health care; the perception that when St. Luke's "buys up" physician practices, costs go up; the burgeoning size of St. Luke's; the "grab" of a public resource by a tax exempt private corporation.
- There were also several expressions about the amount of money St. Luke's makes and the prices they charge, given that they are a tax exempt organization.
- Several of those who called for expanding in Boise specifically called out their desire to not have St. Luke's move their downtown facility to Meridian. Many clearly believed the continued presence of the entire Boise medical facility (not just "major services") was at stake.

Assumptions Used in Public Comment Summary: Expand in Boise/Close E Jefferson (Y/N)

- Any St. Luke's affiliate that was Y on Boise expansion knew enough about the Master Plan such that he/she also concurred with closing E Jefferson, and he/she was marked in favor of closing E Jefferson. This assumption was based on knowledge that St. Luke's has actively promoted the Master Plan to their employees, and belief they have similarly done so to contractors, donors, volunteers and retirees.
- If anyone else (i.e., not St. Luke's affiliate) that was Y on Boise expansion specifically called out a Y for closing E Jefferson, it was duly noted. However, if they were Y for expansion but did not specifically call out their support for closing E Jefferson, the "closing E Jefferson" columns were left blank. This approach was conservative: it assumed that these respondents did not necessarily know that Y on expansion meant closing Jefferson, because "closing E Jefferson" was not disclosed as a Master Plan element in St. Luke's PR blitz of late March.
- If someone was N for closing E Jefferson but was silent on expansion, the "expand in Boise" columns were blank
- If they were N on closing E Jefferson but specifically said Y to expansion, a Y for expansion was noted.
- If they were N on Boise expansion, a N on closing Jefferson was assumed.

Increased traffic and new traffic configurations would certainly encourage people to get off the bike and back into a car.
- 2. I don't understand why St. Luke's would choose a downtown Boise location, rather than the large Meridian campus. Hi Lauren,

Enjoyed reading your posts from China – running on the Great Wall is awesome!

I appreciate your response to my letter to the Mayor and all City Council members regarding St. Luke's. I'm sure there is a ton going on behind the scenes, but there are some important issues and opportunities that did not come out at the hearings that I think it's critical for City Council to be aware of before the vote. As you know, this is not my area of expertise. I have just been doing a little research and talking to a few people, and a good friend of mine has been analyzing data from the Master Plan. Some of the things that have surfaced include:

- Medical Office Building space is about 45% of the proposed expansion (in square feet), while the hospital is 55%. Couldn't medical office buildings be located elsewhere in the city without compromising care? Medical office buildings could actually help bring much-needed economic activity to other, less congested, areas of the city like Americana Blvd and River St. (where they already own property, I think) or downtown Boise's West End.
- It looks like traffic related to the First Street Medical Office Plaza (4,078 new trips) was not included in the traffic analysis. If that's added to the 13,262 new daily trips that the Master Plan projects, then the total becomes 17,340 new trips. Of that total, nearly 64% is attributed to medical office buildings. Dispersing those buildings would reduce traffic concerns enormously.
- Total projected daily traffic for the Warm Springs/Broadway intersection would be 54,000 trips per day equivalent to current trips at the Franklin/Milwaukee intersection by the mall! The Warm Springs/Broadway intersection would have 27 lanes entering/exiting the intersection same as Franklin/Milwaukee today.
- ICL and Advocates for the West are petitioning the EPA to declare Ada/Canyon Counties as nonattainment areas. I have made a few calls to learn about any analysis done regarding the potential impact on air quality of the expansion, and haven't been able to find any information. I can't help but think that locating some of this proposed expansion elsewhere, near the Connector and/or the Interstate, would have a less detrimental impact on air quality.

I'm wondering if you could find a half hour to explore these issues further. I'd like to include my friend Bob who has done a lot of this analysis. It would be fun to host you in my office, but I'm happy to meet you wherever it's convenient. I am not against St. Luke's expansion. If done right, it could be great for the city and St. Luke's. I hope we can find a time to talk about it. Thanks for your time and all you do for Boise.

Why aren't other options being discussed? Like offices over on Americana where the old store area?

Where is the transparency and information?

The more I learn, the crazier their request becomes. Where is the idea the city has always pushed of downtown being pedestrian/biker friendly? This change is going in the opposite direction of all that the city has been trying to accomplish with bike paths, bike rentals, and even the proposed trolley system (which would be a great system especially if they moved health offices to Americana).

Please do NOT approve St. Luke's expansion.

I am writing to voice my strong concern and disapproval of the St Luke's Master Plan. As a homeowner and resident of the East End the since 2009, I was attracted to the East End because of the thoughtful balance between "downtown and neighborhood" and "commercial and residential". Having these elements co-exist with both street-size and building-size being balanced is a unique and powerful attraction.

I support having a residential area with a community hospital nearby. If St Luke's feels that it will need to move some services to Meridian in order to expand, I think that is a good choice and I support having them do that. The infrastructure in Meridian would support those increased services much better than the East End, without impacting existing residential and small commercial neighborhoods. Having a mega-hospital would overwhelm nearby residential areas, due to necessary traffic, parking, and building requirements. It moves tax-paying residents away from a good quality of life in favor of a non-tax paying hospital whose needs and goals will supersede the surrounding neighborhoods. Home values nearby may decrease as people move away from the resulting noise and congestion and thriving neighborhoods and schools become lower-income areas. Rather than the solid balance we have now in the East End between upper and lower price points, it will move steadily downward, eroding the existing tax base that is in place.

Neighbors Associations exist in Boise because residents (homeowners, business owners, and renters) care about their neighborhoods and work hard to keep them in good condition. That doesn't just mean new streets, sewers and services; it means lifestyle elements, infrastructure elements, and strategic planning to keep the balance that allows for a walk-able and bike-able neighborhood with local schools and businesses supporting residents without being taken over by one large company/hospital who owns needs and goals supplant those of everyone else.

More noise, more traffic, larger streets/intersections (27 lanes at Warm Springs & Broadway!), more parking concerns, people from all over the region descending on the limited resources in the East End; none of this is of benefit to Boise. St Luke's overstates this hospital's value to the city. A mid-

size community hospital that offers emergency services and a smaller roster of healthcare services is appropriate and appreciated. The "hospital-city" that would be created and the permanent damage to a 150 year-old area would be a travesty.

I hope that you will vote against the St Luke's expansion. They need to keep streets open, keep streets right-sized for the area, keep growth in check and located where growth is appropriate. Boise is growing and can keep the balance between revenue and quality of life if we do things strategically. St Luke's Master Plan is a bad plan. Please! Vote No!

Lauren,

Just wanted to say thanks for meeting with me and Bob yesterday. It is clear from the City Council meetings and our meeting yesterday that you are fully engaged in this issue and committed to examining it fully before making any decisions. I appreciate that. We also really appreciate your input.

One thing I have been muddling over from our conversation is the issue of how improving roads and intersections just attracts more traffic, and if you don't do the improvements people find another way of getting to their destination. What I can't quite reconcile is that there don't seem to be many options to the Warm Springs/Broadway intersection for people traveling to/from the East End whether by car, bike, or on foot, particularly if Jefferson is closed and Military Reserve/State/Fort area is messy. It's not easy to find an alternate route to get to the Connector, or WinCo, or the airport, or even downtown, without going through the Warm Springs/Broadway intersection or going way out of the way. The only reasonable alternative I can think of is to go to Walnut and cross Warm Springs (which is hard most times of day), to get on Park Center. The Walnut/Warm Springs intersection is already difficult and it doesn't seem like Walnut can handle a lot of traffic, either. Just something I have been trying to figure out.

Dear Mayor Bieter and City Council,

I will unfortunately be out of town during the public hearing on June 30, so wanted to write out what I would have said.

I have listened carefully to both sides of this debate and appreciate the different points of view. But as someone who lives within a few blocks of St Luke's, I am opposed to the proposed expansion.

Mainly, I'm struck by the fact that St Luke's was already permitted to close down Bannock to allow previous expansion, but hasn't used its land very effectively. I mean really - 1/4 of their footprint is allocated to an inefficient parking structure and open space.

Sure, we can all appreciate open space. But why does *my* open space have to be sacrificed first? Why am *I* being asked to fix St Luke's planning problems so they can save some money? That's just grossly unfair. After all, St Luke's is the one with all the resources: they've peppered my neighborhood with fliers, put up a huge ad on the connector, and offered testimony training resources to thousands of employees. If they really want to improve health care delivery as they advocate, they already have the space and the resources to do it.

I also share many of the concerns raised by others. Connectivity is a huge issue for me because, for safety reasons, I consistently use Jefferson and avoid larger roads. St Luke's plan basically shuffles me off onto major boulevards. Maybe that's faster, but it certainly isn't safer. And St Luke's has been strangely resistant to provide a reasonable plan to ensure safe bicycle traffic across its compound. Even recent modifications do not allow for clear bicycle flow-through.

I know St Luke's argues that they will improve traffic flow to accommodate an expected large influx of cars. I don't see how that helps. After all, the quality of a neighborhood - MY neighborhood - isn't defined by the number of cars you can pump through per hour. Increasing traffic in response to the expansion only hurts me and my neighbors.

More generally I question St Luke's long-term goals. Is it wise to expand a major medical complex in the middle of a city when there are *so* many issues with access, traffic and congestion?

Last, I know St Luke's employees want this expansion because they prefer to work downtown rather than elsewhere. Partly that's because I have such a nice neighborhood. So nice, in fact, that they prefer to use every square inch of parking on my street rather than use their own free parking facilities. But I'm not sure they realize that expansion will lessen the quality of my neighborhood. No one wants to live next to a medical-industrial complex, which is the ultimate outcome of all this. I sincerely hope you will help ensure that's not my future.

Dear Mayor Bieter,

As I've not heard back from you regarding my June 17 email I wanted to try again to inquire about our conversation following the St. Luke's special work session in May. You had raised the idea of minute bundling as technique Council has used at times in order to hear more developed and thoughtful information than the typical 3 minutes can provide. My understanding is that a decision has been made to not allow this at next Tuesday's hearing. I was sorry to learn of this decision and would like to inquire as to the Council's reasoning.

After the May work session and learning there would be no additional sessions before the hearing Keep Boise Connected (KBC) decided to try and bring an outside expert on hospital facility planning and health districts in an effort to get answers to some still unanswered questions. As you know they are bringing David Allison here for this purpose. They were disappointed in learning Council was not interested in giving him time on the agenda but the opportunity to bundle would allow him this time and frankly likely bring some time efficiency to the evening.

It seems, given the extraordinary process created in order for Council and the community to more fully understand St. Luke's position through the two special work sessions held in April and May that you would also want to give differing views some equal opportunity in order for all to better understand them. As you know many community members were hoping for such an opportunity in a third work session. As that did not occur, it seems the best opportunity for this information to be heard would be to allow 10 individuals who otherwise would use their 3 minutes to briefly articulate their views to give them to Mr. Allison.

So I am requesting one last time that Council consider this option.

I included Council and staff on this email as I also wanted to clarify some misunderstanding as well as confirm information as to whether the three neighborhood associations (EENA, NENA, DBNA) can choose to use their alloted time however they wish to use it.

I personally approached Mark Baltes and Jeff Kuhns on the NENA and DBNA Boards respectively because I have communicated with them at length about the proposed St. Luke's Master Plan and I knew of our shared concerns. I wanted to let them know that KBC was bringing David Allison to present some alternate perspective on hospital expansions and in depth expert knowledge about the creation of health districts. I sent them an article by Mr. Allison for them to determine if they felt he had something to offer from their neighborhood

perspectives and asked on behalf of KBC to consider offering him some of their alloted time if they felt it would be beneficial to their neighborhoods. KBC offered this to these two associations rather than request it of them.

Both took this to their boards, then one asked city staff whether or not they could do this and were told "no" they could not. I think, unfortunately the request was misunderstood/misrepresented as whether or not they could give some of their time to EENA.

To clarify, EENA has not requested additional time nor would we, from these or any other neighborhood associations as we appreciate that fact the city has already offered us more time than any other association. That said, the EENA Board has agreed that if other time cannot be provided, whether through bundling or sharing we will give him some of our time.

EENA and KBC hope you will find Mr. Allison's information valuable and help you better understand our positions on and reasons for not supporting the **proposed** master plan. I cannot speak for NENA or DBNA although I have heard from some of them that they too see benefit and value in having Mr. Allison speak. If you decide to reconsider I encourage you to ask them what they would like to do.

I hope you understand these efforts are truly In the spirit of wanting to support our mutual goal for making Boise the most livable city.



Greetings:

I hope this finds you all well.

Attached find a letter from Adam Orens, Managing Director with BBC Research and Consulting in Denver, CO. I'm sending this to you directly since it's too late to make it into the council packet and it seems worthy of your consideration.

Mr. Orens' areas of expertise include "fiscal impact analysis, real estate development feasibility analysis and regional economics. [He] also has experience in impact fee design and market research." (from www.bbcresearch.com)

As members of Keep Boise Connected, Inc (KBC) worked to understand aspects of the proposed hospital expansion, we sought an independent/objective third party with expertise in economic impact analysis and regional economics. This was in response to concerns raised by P&Z Commissioner Miller about St. Luke's 'alternatives analysis,' which he described as 'confusing and conclusory.' (2/9/15 P&Z minutes, p. 77.)

KBC members were referred to Mr. Orens and simply asked for his professional opinion on the likely economic impacts of St. Luke's proposed expansion—whether located in Boise or elsewhere in Treasure Valley. We don't take a position on Mr. Oren's opinions, but hope they are worth reviewing.

KBC members support a broader discussion of the costs/benefits of the St. Luke's expansion. We know the costs...sacrificing a public right-of-way, loss of direct connectivity, and significant impacts to surrounding neighborhood values. Like Boise P&Z Commissioners, we have concerns about many areas of the proposed master plan, which we believe to be incompatible with key values expressed in Blueprint Boise. What remains elusive is an independent analysis of benefits.

We are long-time supporters of the City of Boise and its many great accomplishments. To a person, we have all consistently supported open space, schools, public safety and diversity though our voices, votes, taxes and direct personal investment. Some of us are regular participants in local planning efforts.

My work with rural communities has caused me to ask every resident the same question: "What are you personally willing to sacrifice or contribute to make your community stronger?" If the answer is 'nothing' then the future is bleak.

Like each of you, KBC members want Boise to continue to be one of the best cities in America and we're willing to step up. The work we have done hasn't been easy or comfortable; we do it because we believe Boise works best when citizens are engaged in a collaborative process. As stated in all our materials, we aren't anti St. Luke's or anti growth; we simply have a different perspective on several key issues of the proposed master plan.

Bigger isn't always better, but it's always bigger. The evolution of the East End and our health care services demand new thinking that reflects current urban planning principles and supports a diverse and connected health district.

You've likely heard from other KBC members that believe true stakeholder collaboration would be less costly and more productive than conflict. We're trying to do our part to broaden the discussion, and welcome the opportunity to work together to support a healthy economy, sound land use and transportation planning, public health and safety quality affordable health care, and above all, community good will and confidence in the planning process.

I appreciate what each of you contributes and sacrifices to make this city great.

Dear Mr. Kingston:

Thank you for contacting me. It was great to meet you and talk about all the exciting events happening in Boise these days. It truly seems like a great city with a high quality of life. I have been thinking about our conversation about the hospital expansion and I felt compelled to write you this letter because I think the misinformation the hospital is spreading is doing the Boise community a great disservice.

First I want you to know that I am agnostic as to whether the hospital expands in place or moves to Meridian. There are many reasons to be for or against the hospital proposal, however, the economic arguments the hospital is promoting in its printed material is not valid. I am a practicing professional economist with six years of post-secondary schooling and a decade of experience in regional economic modeling and economic impact studies. I've completed several economic impact studies on behalf of hospitals in Denver and the Vail Valley as they considered options upon becoming space-constrained. Healthcare and hospitals are a vital part of the services the Boise area provides the region.

Every economic impact study I've been associated with, as either an author or reviewer, starts with defining the appropriate study area. The study area is the lens through which all economic results are interpreted. The study area is usually what I like to call a 'functioning economic unit'. The Treasure Valley is a complex and integrated economy that is not divided materially by political boundaries. Goods and services, workers and supplies flow freely from Boise to Meridian to Kuna to Caldwell and beyond virtually unimpeded. In order to talk about economic benefits to the city of Boise, one must talk about economic benefits to the regional Boise economy, because the Boise economy extends beyond the city boundaries.

The hospital will bring the same economic benefit to the Boise region whether the hospital is fully in Boise or in several communities in the region. No jobs will be lost, no hospital services

will be lost, and no difference in economic benefit will be discernable if select hospital services move just several miles away.

This is not a new story in the evolution of cities. Hospitals are often built on the edge of a city and they outgrow their location as the city fills in around the facility and the hospital builds a modern campus in a nearby suburban community. The doctors remain in the region; the patients remain in the region; and the economic benefits remain in the region.

I hope this letter helps you refocus the community discussion on the more relevant merits and tradeoffs associated with the hospital proposal.

Mona and have lived in Boise's East End for 30 years, and it seems that St. Luke's has been building non-stop for all of those years.

Now the hospital wants approval for a plan for growth for the next 30 years, and so it will continue until one day the City of Boise says "no more." That day has come.

The reason is that St. Luke's downtown exists in a residential neighborhood. Because of geography, there are only three roads that lead from Boise's East side to downtown and the West, and all three roads lead to St. Luke's, already a bottleneck area.

St. Luke's is a large corporation (which pays no taxes), its corporate headquarters in a residential area, and big division in a non-residential area. Why grow the residential area division? To save money, sure; for prestige, sure. To help St. Luke's maintain or grow its market share, sure.

I think it will definitely hurt the character of our neighborhood and I believe other options exist that will not leave such a big footprint. I don't think their plan is consistent with the way we want our city to grow. The 1200 car parking lot at the intersection of State, Fort, and 1st street is very poor planned and will result in total gridlock as all those cars take left turns off an already crowded city street (especially since they want to close Jefferson!). We live off Reserve Street and will be practically trapped from getting to downtown due to the expansion. Our best option will be to take streets that go through the baseball fields, community center, and senior citizen center in order to avoided the gridlock. That doesn't seem right or safe.

To Boise City Mayor and City Council,

I respectfully submit my comments regarding the expansion of St. Luke's Regional Medical Center at the corner of Warm Springs Boulevard and Broadway Avenue. The following are concerns I believe effect current conditions surrounding the expansion and reach far into the future.

BIKES ON A HOSPITAL CAMPUS.

1. Operating bicyclists do not belong traveling through the hospital campus in close proximity to the planned Pocket Park. As the Dr. explained before the Council, the Pocket Park will be a place of peace and calm for patients and families.

Bike traffic will diminish this experience.

Who will monitor the bike activity through the area?

The park is private property, and I theorize it will take only a few incidents between a bicycle rider and a patient or family member, or hospital staff when St. Luke's decides bicycle use is not compatible with hospital surrounds; by the way, a good decision. A reversal of the original agreement between St. Luke's and the City – through bike traffic - will be banned, the promise broken without another thought.

WHO USES JEFFERSON?

- **2.** St. Luke's commented to the effect that they know the type of people using Jefferson and their purpose "people riding to the Saturday market." This could not be further from truth. Jefferson is used by many kinds of bicycle commuters including myself traveling west to work.
- **3.** The above point would've become righteously clear if all eastside neighborhoods, Warm Springs Mesa, Harris Ranch, and Southeast (now incorporated into Harris Ranch) had been included in the public process. More than one neighborhood east of St Luke's will have its quality of life forever changed.

GO WEST BY BIKE.

4. St. Luke's was given a public roadway, Bannock, and now claims there is no other option than to take Jefferson, too.

I use Jefferson to travel west by bike to commute downtown and beyond. I do that by riding in the bike lane along Warm Springs avenue. Prior to the intersection at Broadway and Warm Springs, a right turn at the cemetery is necessary to access Jefferson thereby avoiding the life threatening obstacles of biking Idaho and/or State.

Idaho Street is: (1) very narrow and does not have a bike lane; (2) an arterial roadway, heavily trafficked by cars for the same reasons cyclists travel west; (3) lined on both sides with parked cars obstructing the view of drivers trying to cross or make a right turn onto Idaho; and, (4) requires cars to inch out onto Idaho in order to see around the parked cars putting oncoming traffic, car or bike, at risk of being hit.

Each of these obstacles is an invitation for serious injury or death. The number of residents in harm's way will increase as the number of projected eastside dwellings (approximately 3000) increases.

THE GREENBELT.

5. Kristen Armstrong suggests riders use the Greenbelt. She rides the streets because she is an experienced and assertive rider. If she rode the Greenbelt recently she would know that the Greenbelt may be appropriate for recreational riders but is no longer a viable route for a bike commuter. I would argue that the Greenbelt is no longer safe for either bicyclists or pedestrians because overcrowding.

BOISE STATE V.S. ST. LUKE'S.

- **6.** The collision between St. Luke's and Boise State's expansion plans hasn't been mentioned or addressed publically. They cannot be dealt with in isolation of the other.
- Heck, St. Luke's planners admitted that future Warm Springs traffic increases were not considered in their traffic analysis.
- 7. A roundabout is planned for traffic (mitigation) at Warm Springs and Broadway. It will have to be the largest seen in the western United States. We are kind, generous people in Boise, but even during rush hour we have our limits. At the intersection of public school, commuter, BSU, and hospital traffic everyone will happily and generously merge? The traffic congestion will be intolerable. Has the idling time and car exhaust been considered in the air quality analysis?

CONTRADICTION IN LONG RANGE DEVELOPMENT PLANS.

8. The expansion discussion is focused on, how can we not inconvenience St. Luke's? On the other end of Warm Springs, developers are required to mitigate for traffic - beyond their borders. The projected traffic increases over the next 10 yrs. requires developers to build infrastructure encouraging alternative modes of transportation. I do not see that St. Luke's is being held to the same standard within the context of their plan. Its plans do not align with the values of Boise's Comp Plan.

AIR QUALITY.

9. Just a quick question on air quality. Has there been an analysis? St. Luke's estimated daily 1000+ cars trips. An analysis should have included the increase in helicopter flight fumes. I worked on the 9th floor below the helicopter landing pad, not good. At that time, St. Luke's didn't have an air filtration system strong enough to mitigate the fumes. Many complaints by patients, families, staff.

LEGACY. WILL THE COMMUNITY ONE DAY BE ASKING, WHO LET THIS HAPPEN?

- **10.** In 15 years from now will we be asking how this could have happened? This used to be such a wonderful part of town to live in.
- 11. When development as large as St. Luke's and Boise State collide, the effect on surrounding neighborhoods is well documented. The quality of life degrades from the common causes increase in traffic and overall congestion, noise from motorists, emergency vehicles, and helicopter flights, and light pollution, decrease in air quality.
- 12. The first, to be directly affected, will be the East End Neighborhood. The make-up of the residents will change; over time there will be fewer and fewer owner-occupied houses. More than likely BSU students will rent. Having lived through expansions of a major university, I would estimate that within 10 years the quaint East End will have changed dramatically. Thus the unspeakable words, urban decay. Yes it can happen in Boise, we cannot change human behavior, especially when it comes to where we live and one's quality of life.

Whose problem will it be 15 years from now?

SOLUTIONS:

- **1.** Continue the Warm Springs Boulevard bike lane west onto Idaho. Remove all on street parking on the right side for visibility.
- **2.** St. Luke's has <u>ample space and options to remodel the entire first floor</u> of the main building by relocating administrative offices, supportive services, the pharmacy, and other miscellaneous uses (chapel, gift shop, coffee kiosk) to create the space needed to accommodate the expansion of the Emergency Room with the desired proximity for the lifesaving services they require.

The East End Neighborhood Association (EENA) is on record as opposed to St. Luke's proposed Master plan and recommends against adoption of this plan as an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan, Blueprint Boise, in large part due to proposed closure of 2 blocks of Jefferson but also because we believe a true, public alternatives analysis was never conducted. One that looks at all aspects to this plan from both the hospital's needs for expansion and facilities improvements AND the community's needs for growth and development. The plan criteria included mostly internal considerations with few considerations of the community. Resulting in a plan that has arrived at unsupported conclusions. In short we believe many options were not considered and this plan does not achieve Boise's LIV goals of Livability, Innovation and Vibrancy. We request Council deny this application in order to allow a better process that seeks an outcome that strives to fulfill that vision.

We concur with the findings of the Planning and Zoning Commission that this proposal

- a. Does not comply with Blueprint Boise
- b. Lacks adequate cost benefit analysis to support giving of a major public asset, i.e. two blocks of public right of way on Jefferson Street
- c. Lacks an adequate alternatives analysis to support the conclusion that the proposed expansion plan is the best option for the City
- d. The alternatives analysis inadequately considered criteria related to the community and surrounding neighborhoods and properties.

We challenge all five findings in the staff report and its conclusion that since the P & Z hearing, there have been changes to the plan that address these issues as well as others previously raised in the record.

"a) The amendment is required for the public convenience or necessity, or for the general welfare of the community."

We find this finding incorrect on two points. It implies that this master plan is the only way for St. Luke's to "provide for the health needs and welfare of the community..." and it further states the plan has adequately considered the "infrastructure needs and other mitigation to minimize impact on the community."

"b) The amendment is necessary to address changes in conditions within the community that have occurred since the Boise Comprehensive Plan was adopted or is necessary to correct one or more goal, objective or policy that exist in the plan."

We disagree with this finding as it also implies this plan is necessitated by the changing and growing medical needs of our community and that the proposed plan will improve the deteriorated transportation system around the St. Luke's facility. It is unclear whether this plan is the best plan to address changes that have occurred in the community and we challenge that it "proposes appropriate mitigation for existing and projected transportation deficiencies in the larger area."

- c) The amendment is in compliance with and will further the goals, objectives and policies of the Boise City Comprehensive Plan.
- d) The amendment will not create inconsistencies between the goals, objects and policies within or between any chapter of the Boise City Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning and Zoning Commission's decision is in complete opposition of both these findings. The proposed mitigations are inadequate solutions for the loss of this public ROW, the connectivity it provides and the compromises this plan would allow to Blueprint Boise goals and objectives as well goals

and policies in various downtown and other planning area policies cause us to find fault with these two findings.

e) The amendment will not place an undue burden on transportation or other public facilities in the planning area, and does not adversely impact the delivery of services by any political subdivision providing services.

Ada County Highway Commission made it very clear when they heard the application that they were not decided on vacation of the proposed two blocks of Jefferson and not convinced this was an acceptable action to take.

Here are our comments regarding the findings analysis of goals and policies from Blueprint Boise.

Chapter 2, Principle #1 ES9.5: Reuse of Buildings Goal NAC14

We find demolition of an entire block of perfectly usable structures that would likely better serve future economic development in Boise and its downtown defeats this principle in Environmental Stewardship. A better solution would be for St. Luke's to rebuild one or more of it's existing parking structures creating both an opportunity to create a mix of uses as well as fix facilities that clearly were not built with future development in mind.

Principle #3 - A Community of Stable Neighborhoods and Vibrant Mixed Use Activity Centers

NAC14.3: Protective Measures

Due to the lack of adequate alternatives analysis there is no "emergency" merit to this proposal.

Principle # 4: A Connected Community

Goal CC2: Create an interconnected network of complete streets that serve all modes of transportation.

CC2.1: Connectivity

- (a) Develop a street network that interconnects and distributes vehicle, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic to multiple streets.
- (c) Explore opportunities to improve connectivity in existing neighborhoods without widening existing streets.

DT-C 1.5: Bicycle Network (a) and (b) Implement the improvements to the bicycle network identified in the Downtown Boise Mobility Study – Implementation Program as resources allow.

Jefferson is identified in DBIP as an important east-west corridor and ACHD began the process of converting it to 2-way with sharrows identifying it as a bike route just last fall. Low volume, low speed streets, especially in a well-connected network grid, are considered quality locations for bike network facilities. While the proposed bike lanes on Idaho and Main will help continue to improve the bike network to encourage increased bike transportation, these streets do not fulfill the same safe and direct east west connectivity for biking that Jefferson connecting the east end to the west end and the new Whitewater Park as well as Whitewater Blvd. which provides easy connection to NW Boise.

GOAL DT-C 2 and DT-C 2.6: Connection to Major Activity Centers

The plan does not "build upon existing networks" nor does it "strengthen connections to Downtown... subdistricts" but rather attempts to mitigate loss of both. It is debatable whether 3 blocks of a cycle track on Ave. B strengthens connections to the Boise River, certainly not for East End residents as most use Walnut for this and I doubt many residents north of St. Luke's choose Fort and Ave. B and Broadway for access to the river via bicycle.

A circular cycle track built to allow access around a superblock in order to reconnect with existing facilities on the other side, i.e. shared bike routes on Bannock and Jefferson is not an expansion of facilities, but rather a mitigation to a network disruption. We find this an unacceptable solution for loss of the existing street grid and direct connectivity to downtown. Many of the other "improvements" such as improved sidewalks and crossings likely would be required regardless and the existing facilities have quality sidewalks along most of the streets with detached, landscaped sidewalks. So there is little improvement for the pedestrian and possibly some of the pleasant walking environment that exists today may have to be compromised in order fit all the proposed new facilities into the limited space.

The cycletrack and renovated shared use corridor on Bannock likely reduce rather than enhance safety for biking as a mode of active transportation. The proposed "improvements" to an existing shared use pathway is nothing more than a renovation of an existing route today. A likely outcome is loss of tree canopy and some of wonderful green space there today. Some research indicates that shared use pathways tend to be less safe than low volume, low speed streets for those using biking as transportation mode. The plan does not address the increase in conflicts in the first block which has three heavily used driveway accesses and two major pedestrian crossings that cyclists will have to contend with compared to two minimally used driveways and no pedestrian crossings in the same block of Jefferson. The shared use pathway portion of these two blocks also increases conflicts including an entrance to a parking garage, and multiple pedestrian crossings compared to one well-used pedestrian crossing and one low volume driveway. As this facility is also used for events at the hospital it is closed on average 12 times a year, eliminating this route entirely during those times requiring all users to navigate around the campus.

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The mitigation interrupts the high level of connectivity and does not maintain the traditional street grid and most definitely lengthens the pedestrian trip.

The plan did not work with the neighborhood and surrounding property owners on developing the plan and does not even attempt to approximate the traditional block size, which in downtown Boise is 300 feet.

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(c) Keep residents in these neighborhoods informed about Downtown issues, plans, regulations and development projects, and invite the neighborhood associations to participate in reviewing and commenting on these items.

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- 2. Either the vacation of Jefferson is removed or Bannock be returned to a fully functional public street and is connected to Jefferson through the corner of the cemetery providing this is possible without disrupting gravesites.
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Summary

In summary EENA believes a more robust process with all stakeholders that takes into consideration the goals and planning polices in Blueprint Boise, other planning documents and embraces Boise's LIV that

Boise leaders, staff and citizens have worked hard to put into place, rather than an internal analysis that used limited criteria, would create an excellent outcome for both St. Luke's, their patients, the City at large and surrounding neighborhoods. We encourage Council to deny this application and work with St. Luke's and us on such an effort.

The East End Neighborhood Association (EENA) is on record as opposed to St. Luke's proposed Master plan and recommends against adoption of this plan as an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan, Blueprint Boise, in large part due to proposed closure of 2 blocks of Jefferson but also because we believe a true, public alternatives analysis was never conducted. One that looks at all aspects to this plan from both the hospital's needs for expansion and facilities improvements AND the community's needs for growth and development. The plan criteria included mostly internal considerations with few considerations of the community. Resulting in a plan that has arrived at unsupported conclusions. In short we believe many options were not considered and this plan does not achieve Boise's LIV goals of Livability, Innovation and Vibrancy. We request Council deny this application in order to allow a better process that seeks an outcome that strives to fulfill that vision.

We concur with the findings of the Planning and Zoning Commission that this proposal

- a. Does not comply with Blueprint Boise
- b. Lacks adequate cost benefit analysis to support giving of a major public asset, i.e. two blocks of public right of way on Jefferson Street
- c. Lacks an adequate alternatives analysis to support the conclusion that the proposed expansion plan is the best option for the City
- d. The alternatives analysis inadequately considered criteria related to the community and surrounding neighborhoods and properties.

We challenge all five findings in the staff report and its conclusion that since the P & Z hearing, there have been changes to the plan that address these issues as well as others previously raised in the record.

"a) The amendment is required for the public convenience or necessity, or for the general welfare of the community."

We find this finding incorrect on two points. It implies that this master plan is the only way for St. Luke's to "provide for the health needs and welfare of the community..." and it further states the plan has adequately considered the "infrastructure needs and other mitigation to minimize impact on the community."

"b) The amendment is necessary to address changes in conditions within the community that have occurred since the Boise Comprehensive Plan was adopted or is necessary to correct one or more goal, objective or policy that exist in the plan."

We disagree with this finding as it also implies this plan is necessitated by the changing and growing medical needs of our community and that the proposed plan will improve the deteriorated transportation system around the St. Luke's facility. It is unclear whether this plan is the best plan to address changes that have occurred in the community and we challenge that it "proposes appropriate mitigation for existing and projected transportation deficiencies in the larger area."

- c) The amendment is in compliance with and will further the goals, objectives and policies of the Boise City Comprehensive Plan.
- d) The amendment will not create inconsistencies between the goals, objects and policies within or between any chapter of the Boise City Comprehensive Plan.

The Planning and Zoning Commission's decision is in complete opposition of both these findings. The proposed mitigations are inadequate solutions for the loss of this public ROW, the connectivity it provides and the compromises this plan would allow to Blueprint Boise goals and objectives as well goals

and policies in various downtown and other planning area policies cause us to find fault with these two findings.

e) The amendment will not place an undue burden on transportation or other public facilities in the planning area, and does not adversely impact the delivery of services by any political subdivision providing services.

Ada County Highway Commission made it very clear when they heard the application that they were not decided on vacation of the proposed two blocks of Jefferson and not convinced this was an acceptable action to take.

Here are our comments regarding the findings analysis of goals and policies from Blueprint Boise.

Chapter 2, Principle #1 ES9.5: Reuse of Buildings Goal NAC14

We find demolition of an entire block of perfectly usable structures that would likely better serve future economic development in Boise and its downtown defeats this principle in Environmental Stewardship. A better solution would be for St. Luke's to rebuild one or more of it's existing parking structures creating both an opportunity to create a mix of uses as well as fix facilities that clearly were not built with future development in mind.

Principle #3 - A Community of Stable Neighborhoods and Vibrant Mixed Use Activity Centers

NAC14.3: Protective Measures

Due to the lack of adequate alternatives analysis there is no "emergency" merit to this proposal.

Principle # 4: A Connected Community

Goal CC2: Create an interconnected network of complete streets that serve all modes of transportation.

CC2.1: Connectivity

- (a) Develop a street network that interconnects and distributes vehicle, bicycle, and pedestrian traffic to multiple streets.
- (c) Explore opportunities to improve connectivity in existing neighborhoods without widening existing streets.

DT-C 1.5: Bicycle Network (a) and (b) Implement the improvements to the bicycle network identified in the Downtown Boise Mobility Study – Implementation Program as resources allow.

Jefferson is identified in DBIP as an important east-west corridor and ACHD began the process of converting it to 2-way with sharrows identifying it as a bike route just last fall. Low volume, low speed streets, especially in a well-connected network grid, are considered quality locations for bike network facilities. While the proposed bike lanes on Idaho and Main will help continue to improve the bike network to encourage increased bike transportation, these streets do not fulfill the same safe and direct east west connectivity for biking that Jefferson connecting the east end to the west end and the new Whitewater Park as well as Whitewater Blvd. which provides easy connection to NW Boise.

GOAL DT-C 2 and DT-C 2.6: Connection to Major Activity Centers

The plan does not "build upon existing networks" nor does it "strengthen connections to Downtown... subdistricts" but rather attempts to mitigate loss of both. It is debatable whether 3 blocks of a cycle track on Ave. B strengthens connections to the Boise River, certainly not for East End residents as most use Walnut for this and I doubt many residents north of St. Luke's choose Fort and Ave. B and Broadway for access to the river via bicycle.

A circular cycle track built to allow access around a superblock in order to reconnect with existing facilities on the other side, i.e. shared bike routes on Bannock and Jefferson is not an expansion of facilities, but rather a mitigation to a network disruption. We find this an unacceptable solution for loss of the existing street grid and direct connectivity to downtown. Many of the other "improvements" such as improved sidewalks and crossings likely would be required regardless and the existing facilities have quality sidewalks along most of the streets with detached, landscaped sidewalks. So there is little improvement for the pedestrian and possibly some of the pleasant walking environment that exists today may have to be compromised in order fit all the proposed new facilities into the limited space.

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



Hello Mayor Bieter -

One Doctor's Opinion on the expansion. Thank you!

St. Luke's provides excellent care and top-notch expertise. Hospital executives argue that expansion is necessary because in emergencies, seconds matter. Closure of Jefferson Street would connect emergency services to interventional radiology and save lives.

What save lives are the following: adequate staffing on the front lines of patient care, clinician competence, well-designed processes, and effective communication across the care team. Physical space does not save lives. The larger an organization, the more logistical challenges, and the greater the delays in care. Physical grandeur and proximity do not equal better care. In fact, studies show that patients who have a stroke while in the hospital suffer long delays in getting thrombolysis and life-saving care. Larger facilities are also typically associated with greater overhead which translates into higher costs that are ultimately passed on to us all. Outpatient care costs are substantially higher at a hospital than at a physician's office.

Only a tiny minority of emergency room patients need interventional radiology. Most hospital admissions are for infections, congestive heart failure, drug overdoses, emphysema, blood clots, surgical issues, and the like. What good is it to whisk someone away for intervention while Mrs. Jones lies on a gurney for hours awaiting admission for her pneumonia? The reality is that cardiac and stroke patients are outnumbered by general medical/surgical patients who often sit in emergency rooms for hours awaiting admission and higher level care. Their lives are every bit as important as the stroke patient's.

I would ask our community: Has access to your physician improved as a result of expansion, i.e. by hospital acquisition of local physician groups? Did the quality of your health care improve? Has it become more cost effective? Would you prefer to navigate a larger hospital campus?

St. Luke's has a large enough footprint to reconfigure on its existing acreages without closing tax payer owned roads and encroaching on historic properties to expand intersections and roadways. Options include building upward from the existing hospital parking lot or relocating outpatient services to its other Boise properties. This would leave plenty of room at the existing downtown campus for inpatient services and future growth.

For community health, it benefits all to have a safe route of access to downtown, whether on bike, foot, or car. Jefferson Street is the safest route for a child, commuter or family to access downtown.

The solution to growth is reconfiguration, avoiding duplication of services (leave the trauma care to St. Al's), adequate staffing, and reduction of costly executive and managerial positions.

In conclusion, while I am thankful to have St. Luke's in my neighborhood, there are better ways to spend \$400 million improving heath care in Boise than the proposed campus expansion.

Dear Mayor Bieter and Members of the Boise City Council,

In full disclosure (as evidenced by my signature) I am a St. Luke's employee. However, I am also writing you this morning as a long-time resident of historic east Boise, mother, public health professional, recreational cyclist, and regular patron of many downtown Boise establishments.

For a decade, my husband and I have raised our family of four boys in east Boise off of Warm Springs. Currently, my children attend Boise High, Roosevelt Elementary and the Downtown YMCA Children's Village. We commute regularly as a family into the downtown core via bicycle, using 3 adult bikes, 1 child's bike, 1 Tag-Along bike and 1 bike trailer. Safety is our utmost concern.

Additionally, my oldest child often rides alone or with friends to Boise High for school or sports. Last fall, my son's best friend was hit on his bike in the intersection of Fort and Reserve by a hit-and-run driver. Due to heavy congestion at numerous points during the day, this is a very dangerous, uncontrolled intersection. Since that time, I have been deeply concerned about the safety of any route into downtown from the east. As it exists, I feel our current options (and I have attempted them all) between State Street and the Greenbelt fail to provide basic protections for riders. In this heavily trafficked grid, cyclists and pedestrians are at risk...we are simply not seen.

I understand why Jefferson is considered a safe haven and why its closure is concerning; it is one of the less traveled streets and riders feel a small measure of protection using that access point into the downtown core. However, as someone who spends a great deal of time walking the Boise hospital campus, I can tell you this block is not a safe solution. It is packed with parked cars, delivery vehicles, ambulances, and hospital staff crossing from the main hospital into various buildings. Although it is a public street, it essentially functions as an alley behind the hospital with poor visibility for riders.

For these reasons, I ask you to support the St. Luke's Campus Master Plan. Not only does this plan provide room for critical healthcare services to remain in downtown Boise, but it provides a better, safer commute for those traveling on bike or foot from the east end neighborhood. Please take advantage of this opportunity to build something that will benefit our neighborhood for years to come and maintain Boise's reputation as being a city friendly to those on two wheels.

Blueprint Boise calls for the city's growth occurring "in a sustainable, efficient, and responsible manner that maintains and enhances its treasured quality of life, while meeting the challenges of the future."

The Master Plan and supporting documents provide detailed plans of the traffic impacts and mitigation planned for each specific intersection. However, the Master Plan does not articulate the overall, combined impact of changed routes, vastly expanded intersections, and more frequent trips generated by the Medical Office Buildings on vehicle congestion, pedestrian and bicycle safety, air quality and other local facilities. I agree, the current plan to address downtown access for pedestrians and bicycles with a easement, and the agreement to provide this access before the closure of Jefferson does address the specific concerns that I voiced. RE: Please vote no on the St. Luke's Master Plan

We have lived in Boise's East End of Boise at 604 E. Jefferson and 1320 E. Hays Way, (our current address) for over 25 years. We chose to live in this neighborhood due to its livability and close proximity to work, good schools, the Boise River, foothills, and downtown. I pass through the St. Luke's corridor 4 to 8 times per day. We frequently drive, walk, and bike down E. Jefferson to get into downtown. We love our neighborhood and do not want to live any place else. Our daughters were born in the St. Lukes Hospital and we appreciate having this facility as our neighbor. However, it is important to remember that we are a historic neighborhood and that closing part of Jefferson Street and making a "superblock" will increase traffic congestion and reduce the East End's connectivity to downtown.

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We are connected to downtown by State, Jefferson, Idaho, and Main streets. Even without the St Luke's expansion traffic has been increasing due to new development in the foothills and in the Harris Ranch area. The intersections at State and Fort, Jefferson and Avenue B, Warm Springs and Avenue B, and Broadway and the Connector are all getting congested. St. Luke's new expansion plan estimates an additional 17,000 plus traffic trips per day. A large portion of this traffic will be headed to the new employee and patient parking garage turning left across traffic onto 1st and 2nd streets making driving through this area difficult.

Making a left turn onto Warm Springs, across traffic, has become difficult. More traffic will also divert onto Warm Springs and Walnut to avoid getting onto Avenue B adding more traffic to this area. My understanding is that a traffic limit of 1400 trips per day was placed on Warm Springs when the Harris Ranch was first being developed. Will we or have we already exceeded this limit? Heavy traffic on Warm Springs street poses a serious threat to this beautiful and important street. Warm Springs is a historic district and one of the things that makes Boise, Boise.

The increase in traffic will also impact pedestrians and cyclists making it dangerous to cross this area. I believe there are some flashing lights proposed for the pedestrian crossing will be added to make cars aware and stop. I cannot see four lanes of traffic stopping that easily and when they do stop, traffic will start to back up.

The Boise P and Z Commission has denied the St. Luke's application whose proposal is inconsistent with Boise's broader planning and livability goals and plans. St. Luke's has come up with one plan and eliminated all the options (such as developing St. Luke's Meridian and using other St. Luke's sites located in Boise) as too expensive. The neighborhoods have had little input and involvement in their plans.

We believe the St. Luke's Regional Medical facility expansion should be built in Meridian where they have 25 acres and easy access to the freeway. This location is more centralized to the valley's population. The expansions of St. Luke's in Boise on Avenue B will have to cease eventually, as there is no space to keep expanding in this area. The new larger traffic corridor in the East End planned by St. Luke's will make the East End neighborhood like an island with limited direct access to downtown. It will be like hitting a wall when we try to head west out of our neighborhood. I urge you to vote no on the St Luke's Master Plan.

Larger facilities are also typically associated with greater overhead which translates into higher costs that are ultimately passed on to us all. Outpatient care costs are substantially higher at a hospital than at a physician's office.

Only a tiny minority of emergency room patients need interventional radiology. Most hospital admissions are for infections, congestive heart failure, drug overdoses, emphysema, blood clots, surgical issues, and the like. What good is it to whisk someone away for intervention while Mrs. Jones lies on a gurney for hours awaiting admission for her pneumonia? The reality is that cardiac and stroke patients are outnumbered by general medical/surgical patients who often sit in emergency rooms for hours awaiting admission and higher level care. Their lives are every bit as important as the stroke patient's.

I would ask our community: Has access to your physician improved as a result of expansion, i.e. by hospital acquisition of local physician groups? Did the quality of your health care improve? Has it become more cost effective? Would you prefer to navigate a larger hospital campus?

St. Luke's has a large enough footprint to reconfigure on its existing acreages without closing tax payer owned roads and encroaching on historic properties to expand intersections and roadways. Options include building upward from the existing hospital parking lot or relocating outpatient services to its other Boise properties. This would leave plenty of room at the existing downtown campus for inpatient services and future growth.

For community health, it benefits all to have a safe route of access to downtown, whether on bike, foot, or car. Jefferson Street is the safest route for a child, commuter or family to access downtown.

The solution to growth is reconfiguration, avoiding duplication of services (leave the trauma care to St. Al's), adequate staffing, and reduction of costly executive and managerial positions.

In conclusion, while I am thankful to have St. Luke's in my neighborhood, there are better ways to spend \$400 million improving heath care in Boise than the proposed campus expansion.

In full disclosure (as evidenced by my signature) I am a St. Luke's employee. However, I am also writing you this morning as a long-time resident of historic east Boise, mother, public health professional, recreational cyclist, and regular patron of many downtown Boise establishments.

For a decade, my husband and I have raised our family of four boys in east Boise off of Warm Springs. Currently, my children attend Boise High, Roosevelt Elementary and the Downtown YMCA Children's Village. We commute regularly as a family into the downtown core via bicycle, using 3 adult bikes, 1 child's bike, 1 Tag-Along bike and 1 bike trailer. Safety is our utmost concern.

Additionally, my oldest child often rides alone or with friends to Boise High for school or sports. Last fall, my son's best friend was hit on his bike in the intersection of Fort and Reserve by a hit-and-run driver. Due to heavy congestion at numerous points during the day, this is a very dangerous, uncontrolled intersection. Since that time, I have been deeply concerned about the safety of any route into downtown from the east. As it exists, I feel our current options (and I have attempted them all) between State Street and the Greenbelt fail to provide basic protections for riders. In this heavily trafficked grid, cyclists and pedestrians are at risk...we are simply not seen.

I understand why Jefferson is considered a safe haven and why its closure is concerning; it is one of the less traveled streets and riders feel a small measure of protection using that access point into the downtown core. However, as someone who spends a great deal of time walking the Boise hospital campus, I can tell you this block is not a safe solution. It is packed with parked cars, delivery vehicles, ambulances, and hospital staff crossing from the main hospital into various buildings. Although it is a public street, it essentially functions as an alley behind the hospital with poor visibility for riders.

For these reasons, I ask you to support the St. Luke's Campus Master Plan. Not only does this plan provide room for critical healthcare services to remain in downtown Boise, but it provides a better, safer commute for those traveling on bike or foot from the east end neighborhood. Please take advantage of this opportunity to build something that will benefit our neighborhood for years to come and maintain Boise's reputation as being a city friendly to those on two wheels.

We have lived in Boise's East End of Boise at 604 E. Jefferson and 1320 E. Hays Way, (our current address) for over 25 years. We chose to live in this neighborhood due to its livability and close proximity to work, good schools, the Boise River, foothills, and downtown. I pass through the St. Luke's corridor 4 to 8 times per day. We frequently drive, walk, and bike down E. Jefferson to get into downtown. We love our neighborhood and do not want to live any place else. Our daughters were born in the St. Lukes Hospital and we appreciate having this facility as our neighbor. However, it is important to remember that we are a historic neighborhood and that closing part of Jefferson Street and making a "superblock" will increase traffic congestion and reduce the East End's connectivity to downtown.

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We are connected to downtown by State, Jefferson, Idaho, and Main streets. Even without the St Luke's expansion traffic has been increasing due to new development in the foothills and in the Harris Ranch area. The intersections at State and Fort, Jefferson and Avenue B, Warm Springs and Avenue B, and Broadway and the Connector are all getting congested. St. Luke's new expansion plan estimates an additional 17,000 plus traffic trips per day. A large portion of this traffic will be headed to the new employee and patient parking garage turning left across traffic onto 1st and 2nd streets making driving through this area difficult.

Making a left turn onto Warm Springs, across traffic, has become difficult. More traffic will also divert onto Warm Springs and Walnut to avoid getting onto Avenue B adding more traffic to this area. My understanding is that a traffic limit of 1400 trips per day was placed on Warm Springs when the Harris Ranch was first being developed. Will we or have we already exceeded this limit? Heavy traffic on Warm Springs street poses a serious threat to this beautiful and important street. Warm Springs is a historic district and one of the things that makes Boise, Boise.

The increase in traffic will also impact pedestrians and cyclists making it dangerous to cross this area. I believe there are some flashing lights proposed for the pedestrian crossing will be added to make cars aware and stop. I cannot see four lanes of traffic stopping that easily and when they do stop, traffic will start to back up.

The Boise P and Z Commission has denied the St. Luke's application whose proposal is inconsistent with Boise's broader planning and livability goals and plans. St. Luke's has come up with one plan and eliminated all the options (such as developing St. Luke's Meridian and using other St. Luke's sites located in Boise) as too expensive. The neighborhoods have had little input and involvement in their plans.

We believe the St. Luke's Regional Medical facility expansion should be built in Meridian where they have 25 acres and easy access to the freeway. This location is more centralized to the valley's population. The expansions of St. Luke's in Boise on Avenue B will have to cease eventually, as there is no space to keep expanding in this area. The new larger traffic corridor in the East End planned by St. Luke's will make the East End neighborhood like an island with limited direct access to downtown. It will be like hitting a wall when we try to head west out of our neighborhood. I urge you to vote no on the St Luke's Master Plan.

Please consider an alternative street closure of Fort Street for the St. Lukes expansion. St. Lukes now owns the previous Elks Rehab facility, so could focus growth in that direction. Fort Street has far more cyclists and joggers than Jefferson Street.

Cut through traffic using Fort Street negatively impacts the health and safety of many thousands more children and families per day all along this route, traffic which will likely increase with the proposed closure and ongoing valley growth. This is an existing problem that is well documented, has been for decades, without any meaningful corrections despite scores of children being struck by traffic. Fort Street was never intended to be used as it is currently.

Fort Street and nearby school streets and generations of school children were sacrificed a few decades ago to protect politically active residents on other streets, which Mayor Bieter may be able to further explain as his family lived on 8th Street at the time.
